
Top 10 Occupations Projected to Grow

I started to consider my skills and interests - from every aspect of life. Then, I typed every one of those skills and interests into Google, and hit search.


Once I had filtered through the mass of results, I discovered a technical writing job advertisement. When I researched the job requirements, I realised that the role was a perfect fit for me.

TRANSFERABLE SKILLS










According to businesses surveyed by the <u>World</u> <u>Economic Forum</u>, cognitive core skills are growing in importance most quickly.
